## **'Finale' Will Offer American Review Participants Will Parade Before 'Miss America' Group Affects Revealed**

In order to carry out the trend of the times and the spirit of cooperation and unity between the American countries, the theme for the finale of the current Sport Nite presentation will be "America on Parade." The United States, Canada, and the Latin American countries will all be represented in the production.

### **Costumes Are White**

Participants will not wear costumes representing different countries, but will merely carry the flag of the country they represent. The girls' apparel will be a uniform white dress trimmed in red or black according to their respective team.

### **Girls Plan Tableaux**

According to Miss Margaret Smock, girls' gymnasium instructor, who is directing the finale, a large melting pot will be centered between the "gyms." Then the Central Americas, the South Americas, and the North Americas will pass through the pot, grouped in the above manner, while Miss America stands over them. Miss Smock has been experimenting with several different grouping effects and tentative tableau formations. The effect which she desires is to have the group passing through the pot, while the other girls stand behind in tableau groupings. Finally, the entire body will proceed in a build-up effect to where Miss America is standing.

"This finale promises to be the most spectacular display that has ever been presented to a Sport Nite audience," stated Miss Smock, "and I think it will provide a grand climax for this year's show."

Leroy Smith, athletic director, states that field hockey is banished from the Sport Nite program this year, but he also says that a new game called line zigzag will be added. The reason given for abolishing field hockey is the length of time it requires in the program.

This new feature is an intensified basketball exercise in the form of a game. The members of the team face each other in zigzag formation and the ball is passed up and down the lines. Each time one round is completed, a girl sits on the floor and waves the flag of her team. This is done until the last girl, instead of waving her flag, pulls one hanging down from the ceiling, indicating that the team wins the event.

#### Scooter Races to Be Presented

Scooter races will be presented again. Each girl on the team will have hold of a rope fifty feet long. The first girl will run out until the rope is taut, then sit on a scooter and be pulled in. Each successive girl will vary her position on the scooter, some sitting, some standing, some kneeling and some lying on their stomachs.

Originally, Sports Nite was quite a different presentation than the show which is in rehearsal at present. There were no committees to plan each event, and student management for the first few years was in the minority. Captains were elected by the students, but otherwise the physical education department supervised the proceedings.

The entire production was scaled on a far less elaborate basis than it is today. Not as much concern was directed to costumes and decorations.

During the first few years, ballet and prelude did not figure in the program, and rhythmic were likewise a later innovation. Tumbling and pyramids which are no longer included in the program, were featured in the original Sports Nite. Rhythmic have now taken their place.

"Gym" periods a few years back were conducted very much differently also. There was more formality. Every period was divided into designated parts, and each part was devoted to a certain phase of the class instruction. The average "gym" period used to include more marching and calisthenics than at present.

Novelty and skating, which are non-competitive numbers, were added to the program after the first few years.

The finale this year will be entirely different from any previously presented. There will be a parade of the Americas, North, South, and Central.

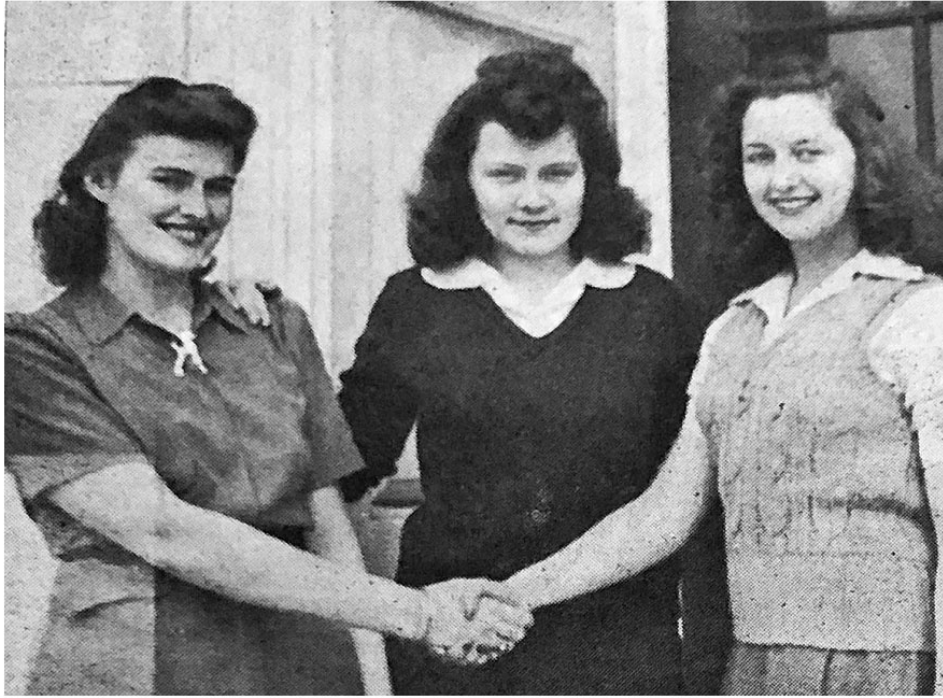

#### Over 2,000 in Program

## Blacks become Piggies

### *Prelude-*

A non-competitive dance is built around the theme, "Red Sails in the Sunset." The girls' costumes will be in red and gray.

### *Tap-*

Blacks will become "Boogie Woogie Piggies," wearing rolled-up overalls, sailor hats, piggy paws and ears, enormous bow ties, and will use blue-dyed baskets.

Red team girls will be transformed into Scotch lassies in Scotch plaid short peated skirts and hats, blouses and white gaiters for "Loch Lomond."

### *Race: Basketball Relay-*

An innovation this year which promises to be an exciting highlight on the program.

Black racers will wear black "gym" suits with white belts and neckerchiefs.

Red girls will wear white "gym" suits with red belts and neckerchiefs.

### *Rhythmics-*

Black team members will become little girls again in short dresses and big sashes and hair ribbons for their balloon routine, "I'm Forever Blowing Bubbles."

Red team girls will become gypsy maidens in bright gypsy costumes with lots of costuming jewelry for "Play Gypsy, Dance Gypsy."

### *Ballet-*

The ballet is a non-competitive dance whose theme will be "An Under-Sea Symphony." Girls will dress to aid in the interpretation of their parts as various forms of aquamarine life.

### *Novelty-*

Red team girls will be dressed in shamrock dresses and in slacks and blouses with green suspenders and sleeve garters for "And the Band Played On."

### *Skating-*

This is also a non-competitive number. Girls will use green and rose beige in their costumes for the "Skaters Waltz."

### *Originality-*

### *Scooter Race-*

The return of a popular feature with some new twists, promises to be full of thrills, spills and loads of excitement.

### *Finale-*

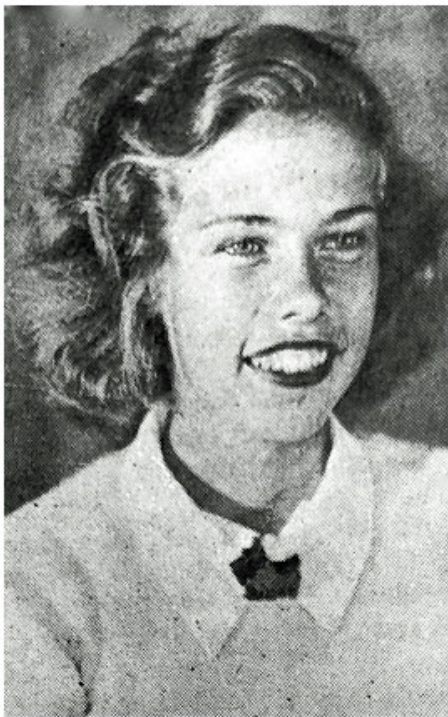
Anyway, we all can talk to each other again in low voices and one can at least hear himself think in the halls. It is a strange silence.

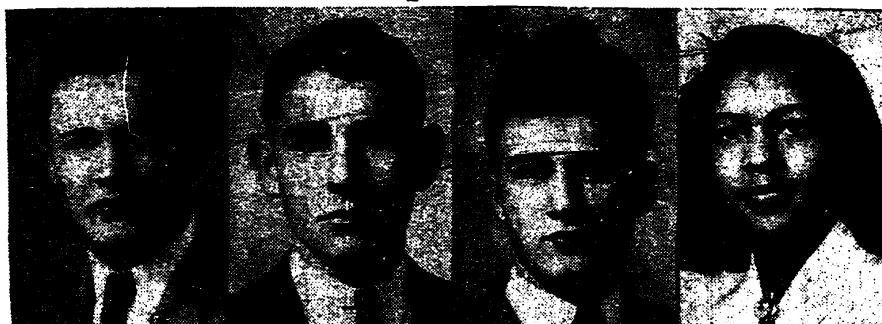
