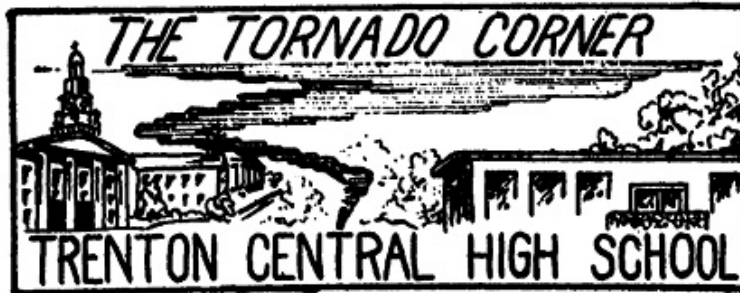

SPORT NIGHT EXTRAVAGANZA PREPARES FOR PRESENTATION

Sport Night, an annual Trenton High highlight, celebrates its twenty-fifty anniversary this year in the school gymnasium.

We think of Sport Night today as an elaborate undertaking, which involves months of hard work. But if one were to trace back to 1935, the beginning of Sport Night, one would probably visualize it as merely a rehearsed presentation of girl's gym classes. The program consisted of Red and Black marching, an originality number, novelty relays, stunts, team songs, novelty relays, stunts, team songs, novelty dances, followed by a grand march of both captains and heads of committees. No original costumes were used as it was a one night affair. After 1948, Sport Night ran for five consecutive nights.

Including last year, the Reds have won twelve times, the Blacks ten, while there have been two ties. Each team competes for twelve points per night.

Program revealed

Under the direction of Mr. Murphey, this year's Sport Night program will consist of Red and Black marching, folk, modern dance, tap, modern exercise, a novelty race, an obstacle race, and a finale. The two non-competitive numbers are the Prelude and the Ballet. The Red and Black bands enable the boys to display their talents each year.

The Reds elected as their captain Lois Torrini and the Blacks elected Bonnie Kelty. Both these girls will have the strenuous task of seeing to it that their team lives up to its former standards in competition, sportsmanship and all round good behavior.

Susan Albert has been chosen Mistress of Ceremonies. Although she is a black team member, she will show no partiality toward one team or the other.

This year's Miss America is Jeanne Quackenboss, a red team member. Her color guards are Virginia Lestlie for the reds and Marie Palmere for the blacks.

Gail Naylor, a black team member, will represent our school with the title of Miss T.H.S. Her red and black team color guards are Pat J

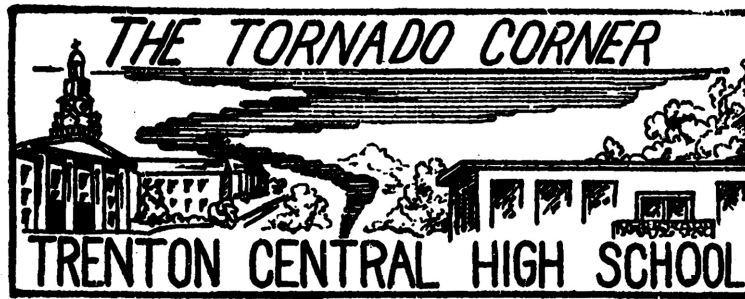
Pat Jaskewicz and Eve Bloom, respectively.

It was announced at this meeting that this year's dues are fifty cents per senior, payable by April 30.

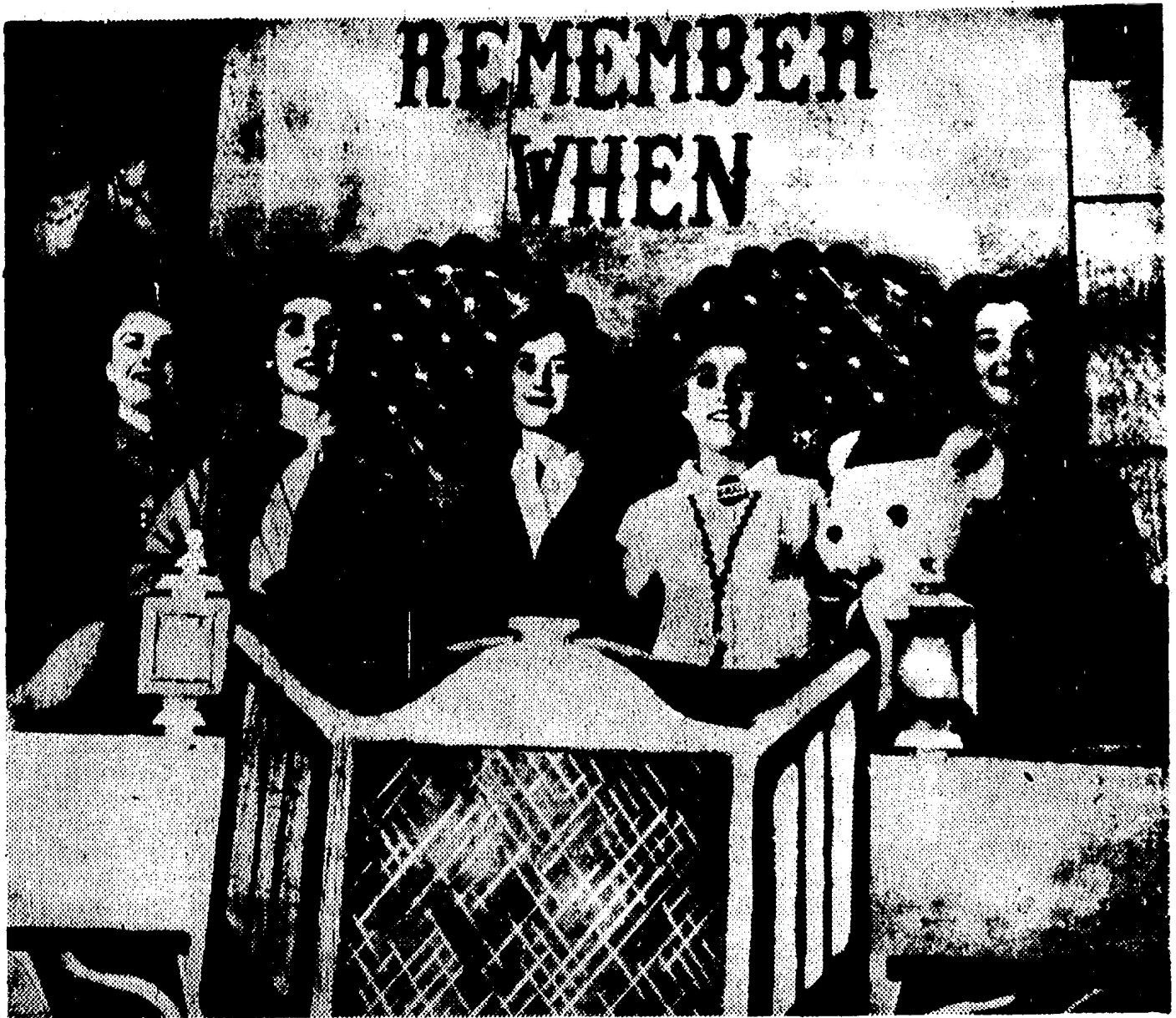

Trenton High To Present 25th Girls' Sport Nite

Reds And Blacks Ready For Big Battle

Girls' Sport Nite, the elaborate Trenton High School extravaganza, marks its silver anniversary this week.

When the "greatest high school show on earth" opens at 8:15 tomorrow night for its first of five presentations, it will depict early days in Sport Nite history.

But depicting history won't be the only way the girls of THS will celebrate their 25th anniversary. The colorful pageant will look into the future as well as the past.

Although the theme is "Remember When," the show will have a touch of everything from Broadway and vaudeville to a juke box jamboree. A Hawaiian holiday will be enacted, as will scenes from "Alice in Wonderland."

Sport Nite first started in 1934. It was a one-night show in those days, but it has grown through the years, until today it is a five-night extravaganza, with all Trenton High girls taking part in one way or another.

Red Team Ahead

Again this year, competition will be keen, with girls of the Black Team out to beat those of the Red Team, and vice versa. In fact, Black Team girls have reason to fight plenty hard this year. The Reds have been champions for the past three years, and have won a total of 12 Sport Nites since 1934. The Blacks won 10 times. There have been two ties.

Team captains for this year's spectacular are Lois Torrini, Red Team, and Bonnie Kelty, Black Team.

Susan Albert will be the mistress of ceremonies; Jean Quackenboss, Miss America; Gail Naylor, Miss Trenton High; Patricia Jandura, Red flag bearer, and Cynthia Guenther, Black flag bearer.

Color guards are Darlene Kidder, Lois Pomiatyszyn, Joan Bonnani, Ellen Garber, Joyce Kish, Merle Palmere, Pat Jas-Kewiez and Eva Bloom.

Boys Assist

Although the program is designed primarily to exhibit the work of girls' classes in physical education, the show could not go on without the assistance of the boys of the scene-shifting crew and those of the bands.

Black Band leader is Edward Bagley and the leader of the Red Band is William Forrester.

The two bands will compete for points, just as the girls will in marching, folk dancing,

novelty racing, modern exercises, obstacle racing, modern dance and other events.

Elaborate Ballet

The show will have non-competitive events also — like an elaborate ballet entitled "Alice in Wonderland." This will show Alice following a white rabbit into a hole, and from there the audience will meet the Mad Hatter, Tweedle Dee and Tweedle Dum, the Queen of Hearts and other famous characters from the old tale.

The show will start with the presentation of team captains, Miss America, Miss Trenton High and the flag bearers. Then will come the Prelude, which this year will portray the theme "Remember When."

It will show: "The sands of time sifting through the hour glass back in time and space to the scene of the first annual Sport Nite which began in the depression year of 1934."

The first competitive event will be marching. And as the marchers enter the THS gymnasium, cheers will echo from the crowd — the same cheers which will continue to rock the gym until Friday night—Finale Night.

Tomorrow's presentation will be Preview Night, followed by Sophomore, Junior and Senior nights, Tuesday through Thursday, and finally the Friday finale. Points will be awarded each night for each competitive event. They are cumulative.

FACTS AND FIGURES

The first Sport Nite in 1935 lasted exactly one night and all the girls of Trenton High participated, exquisitely costumed in the latest in gym suits.

The second Sport Nite in 1936 lasted two nights. It consisted of events including Marching, Tap, Originality Number, Novelty Race, Stunts, Songs, Cheers, and Novelty Dance.

There were fifteen girls in positions of authority. Some of these were Head of Publicity, Program Head, Period Captains, Stunt Captains, Cheer Leader, Score Keeper, Usher Head, and Attendance Girl.

This year's show will be the 25th in the history of Sport Nite. To date the Reds have won 12 times, the Blacks, 10, and there have been 2 ties.

From its modest beginnings, Sport Nite has grown until it is now known throughout the East and has 1300 girls participating.

Hits Sports Nite

Sir — Again we are reading glowing accounts of the annual THS Sports Nite, which each year seems to grow bigger and better.

While I do not place myself particularly in the category of a chronic "kill - joy," I am strongly inclined to question what is involved in this event, and I emerge with considerable doubt as to its value from an educational standpoint to the student body in general, including as it does boys as well as girls.

I wonder if the tax paying public is aware that for a good many school days while this event is in preparation, professional workers hired by them to teach, sit idly by for the most part, not of their choice, but because they are forbidden to instruct classes from which the girls are necessarily missing due to Sports Nite practice. Do parents interested in securing an education for their children realize the waste involved in this?

I am well aware of the value of physical education. Also, I know there are benefits to be gained in working together to put on an event of this kind. But I submit that this production has gone out of bounds. When half of the student body idles along for some two weeks of so-called "activities" days, and teachers trained to teach academics are reduced to the role of baby-sitters, I feel it is time to call a halt.

New Regulations For '60 Sport-Nite

The following are the new rules and regulations for eligibility for Sport Nite-1960 as released by the faculty committee in charge.

RULES FOR CAPTAINS

In order to be eligible for the position of captain a girl must have received a "c" grade or better in June of her Junior year.

RULES FOR HEADS OF COMMITTEES AND MEMBERS OF THE OFFICIAL FAMILY

Any girls interested in these positions must have received a "c" grade or better in June of their Junior year. A girl with one "d" may be eligible if she is approved by the faculty committee in charge. Approval will not be granted until after the student's scholastic record has been checked and permission from her parents, assuming all responsibility, has been received!

RULES FOR HEADS OF SPECIALTIES AND THEIR MEMBERS

In order to be eligible for these positions a girl must have received "c" grades or better at the end of the 1st rating period of her senior year. One "d" may be accepted with the approval of the faculty committee and with the permission of their parents. Thereafter these girls who are approved must maintain "c" grades or better. If these standards are not upheld, the girl must get permission from her parents to continue.

GENERAL RULES

If a girl receives an "e" at the end of the 1st or 2nd rating period of her senior year, she is not eligible for Specialties, non-competitive numbers, or the Official Family. This rule still applies even though she may drop the subject or raise the grade between marking periods. If a girl receives an "e" or "w" in subjects not required for graduation, she is still not eligible.
