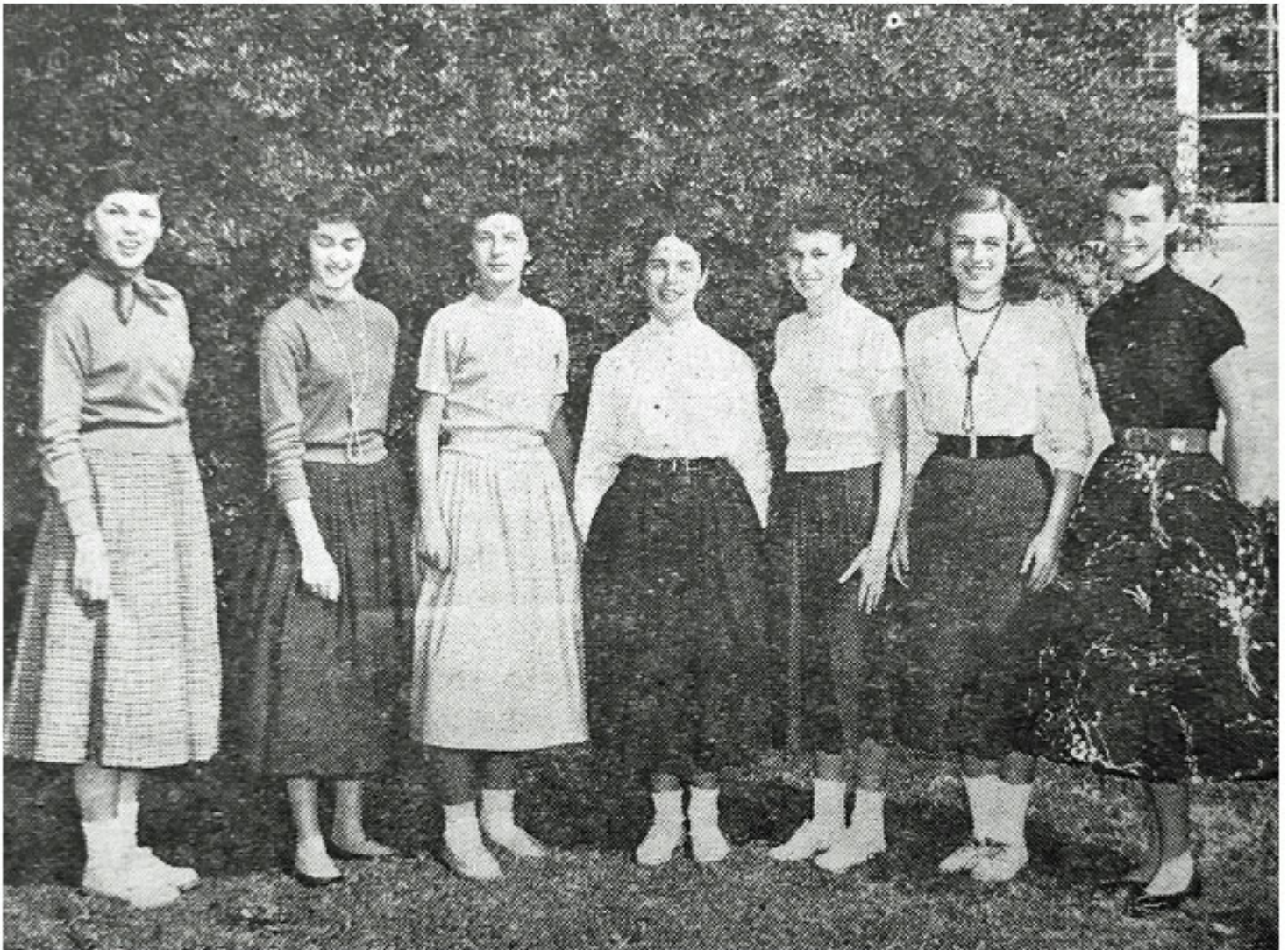

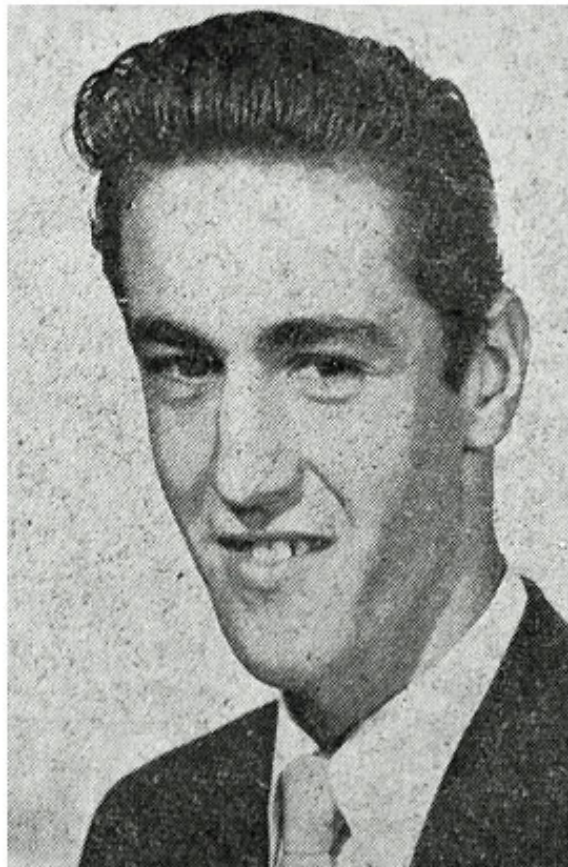
The sixth period dancing class picked Margie Capuano head of Prelude and Lois DiUmberti, Ballet. Prelude and Ballet are non-competitive numbers.

A summary will be presented at the end of the first four nights of the show. On the fifth and final night the entire Sport Nite show will be broadcast.

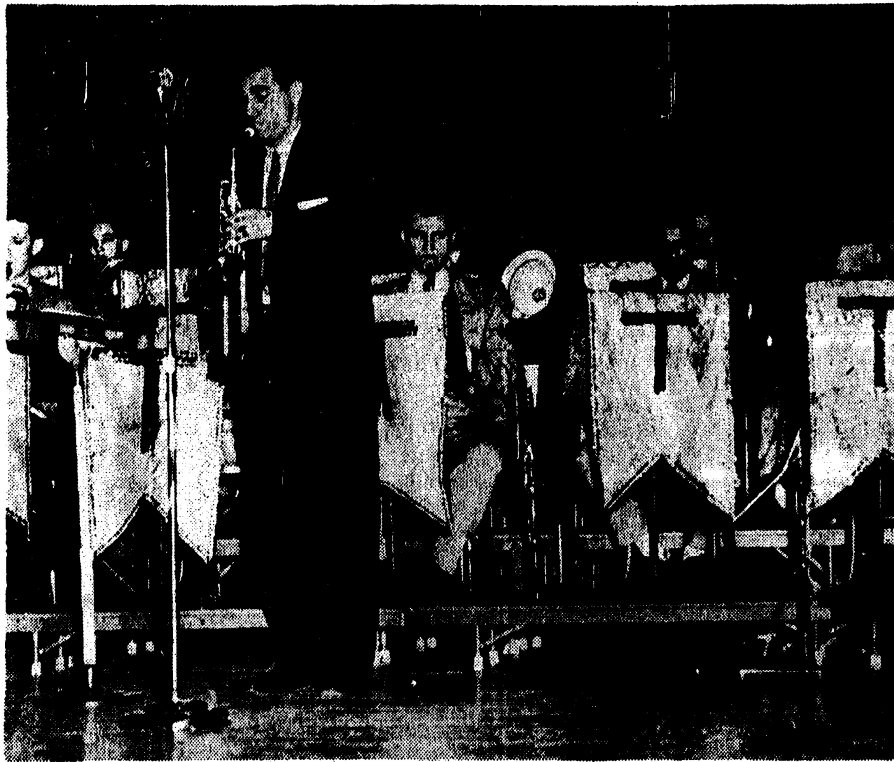

"The Publicity Committee has done a terrific job in saying how great we Blacks are, and next week will be our chance to prove it to everyone.

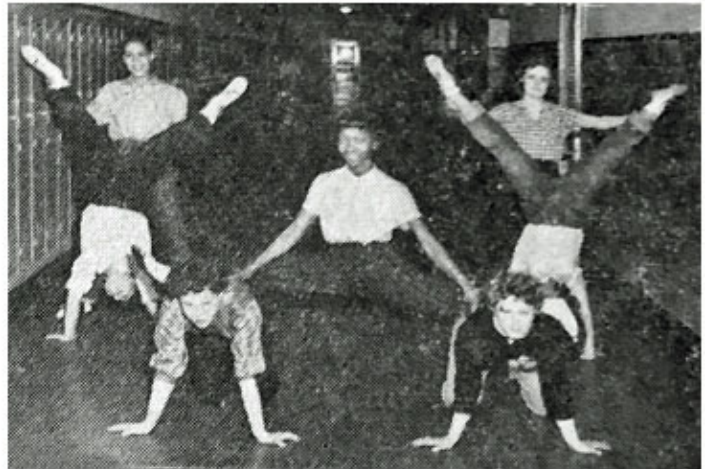
"The Reds have a wonderful captain and team this year, and as leader of the Blacks, I want to wish them good luck.

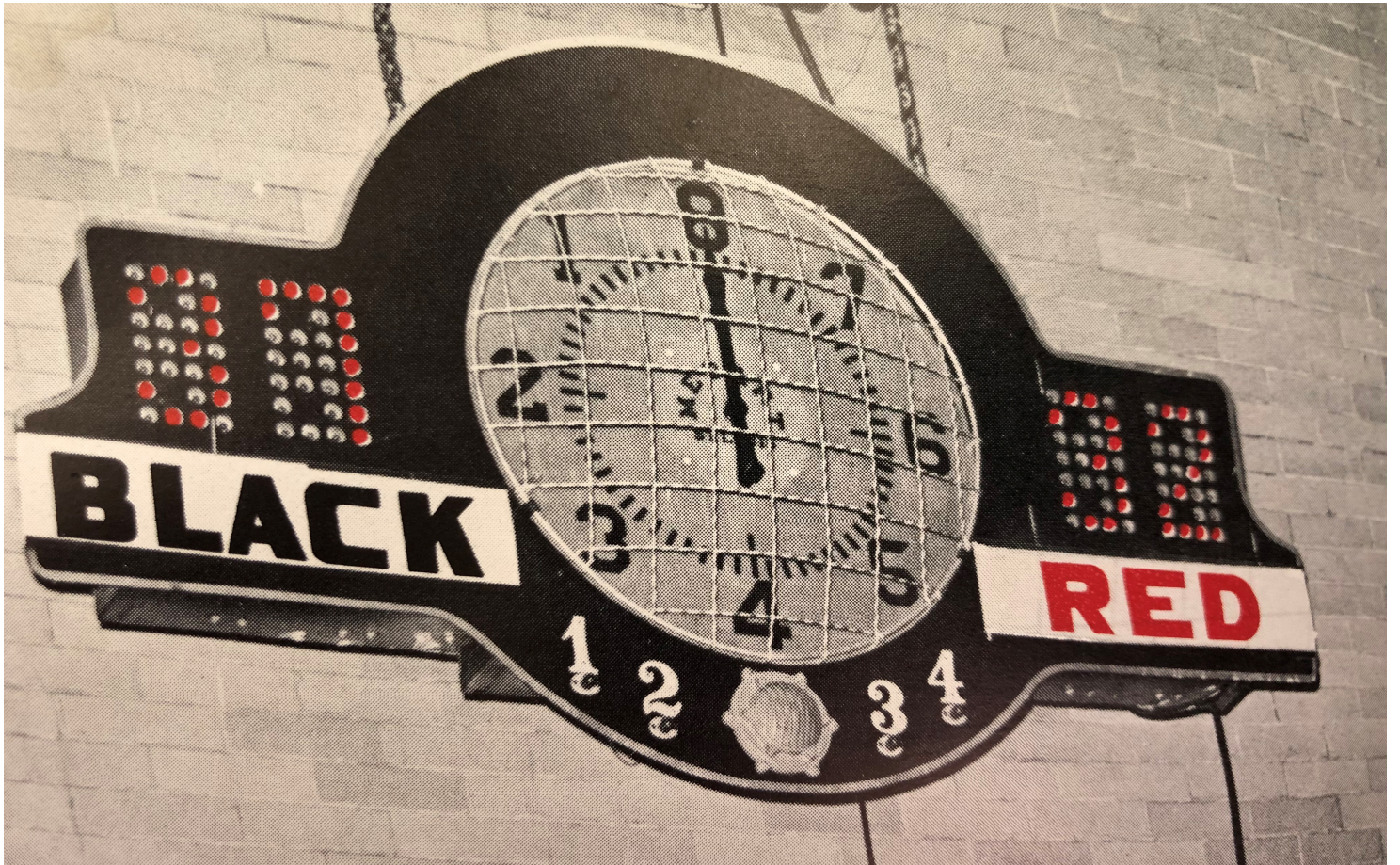

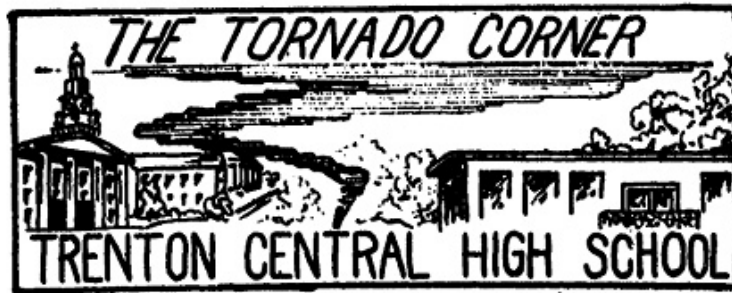
