Girls' Enthusiasm Is Boundless As Sports Nite Draws Near

Walter Krichling's voice came booming over the speakers in Trenton High School's gymnasium and 500 girls worth of noise, enthusiasm and motion came to an abrupt halt.

That much energy could not be controlled for long, so Krichling released it again as the speakers vibrated, "Come on, girls, start off together — everybody hit the first note at the same time."

Hundreds of strident — but somehow melodic — voices screamed out newly-composed words to a tune from the 1930s and 12 swirling girls on the floor began practicing again their part in tonight's 35th annual girls' Sports Nite.

Primarily For Girls
"This is the biggest thing

the school puts on," Krichling said, turning off his microphone and talking above the band playing next to him. "All segments of the school take part, although it's primarily for the girls."

Krichling is in charge of the production which opens tonight at 8:15 and continues tomorrow and Friday. He is also chairman of the physical education department and does numerous other chores around the school.

But at that moment his only concern was keeping his feminine mob under control.

"All right, let's have the next Red team number," he bellowed, and about 50 girls came tap-dancing out of the stands to take their places on the gym floor. Moments later, the band to his right was playing, the girls were danc-

ing and he was talking about the kids and how much work they have done.

Specialty Teams

"We started organizing them in September," he said. "We divided them into Red and Black teams and then helped them form into committees. After Christmas they started organizing and developing the numbers, and after mid-terms in January the girls really got down to business — particularly the specialty teams."

One of the specialty teams came out and whirled through a modern dance interpretation. The members looked as if they could step onto any TV variety show stage and perform without the audience ever guessing they were not professionals.

Krichling smiled and turned away from the microphone.

"The girls do 99 percent of the choreography and arrangements," he said. "The teachers who help us put this together guide them along a little, but it's primarily the work of the girls. Which is one reason why they take the competitive feature of the show so seriously."

Only One Tic

Each production number by both teams is judged and scored and a winner is determined at the end, Krichling explained. After 33 shows (there were no productions in 1968 and 1969 because of s c h o o l disturbances) the series is even with one tie. This might explain the noisy enthusiasm at yesterday's practice.

"For some girls this 'Nite'

takes the place of a varsity sports program," Krichling said. "But for most, it's just a traditional way to express their school spirit, as perhaps their mothers did here years before.

Great Deal Of Work

"The administration sees it as a way to pull the school together. Here you have about 500 girls cheering for themselves and each other after a great deal of work on both sides. You have about 75 boys willing to give up their time to supply the music in the two team bands, to make the decorations and work the lights.

"We feel this gives them something to work for, to be proud of. And that's so important today."

But for most of the 1,000 viewers in the THS gym last night, the points were unimportant. The hundreds of students participating in the extravaganza showed what happiness is by dancing, singing and cheering for three hours.

The students made the costumes, hundreds of them, and they produced the dance routines and exercises and made the scenery during months of rehearsal and preparation.

Screaming For Joy

After each dance routine or song, ear-shattering screams went up from Black or Red team cheering sections.

This is the 35th Sports Nite and the two teams each have won 16 times with two ties.

The Mistress of Ceremonies is Connie Berry, the Black team captain is Virginia Moses and the Red team captain is Prudence Borwn.


Sports Nite returned to Trenton High last year after a two year absence because of school disturbances but the lay-off apparently did not dim the enthusiasm of parents, students and teachers.



A girl in the middle of the gymnasium dropped a black flag and about 300 girls on one side of gym started jumping, yelling, hugging and screaming.

The Black Team had won a point. They were "us" and the boy in the sweatshirt was one of the prop boys who got caught in the excitement of Sports Nite at Trenton High last night.

Red and black are Trenton High's colors and are usually worn by the school's athletes in competition against other schools.

But every year — except for a couple troublesome years — the girls make the colors the names of two teams and compete against each other in a variety of elaborate dancing, singing, cheering and marching routines.

Play Off Tonight

Last night the Black Team captured six numbers against four for the Red Team. The score is now 12 to 10 in favor of the Red Team, which had taken an 8-4 edge Wednesday night. The playoff will begin at 8 tonight.

The band was playing the Marine Corps Hymn only the words had been changed. It went: "Here's our Black Team captain for this year. Virginia is her name. She will fight and fight with all her might to lead the Blacks to fame."

Virginia Moses did a front flip, back flip,

a round off and something called a straddle split on the hard gym floor. Then she walked over toward the "bench" to direct her team.

Virginia was kneeling, biting her lip as her girls danced for an "Indian goddess." The pretty senior, who wants to be a mathematician, said she'd really be disappointed by a loss. "If they win, they'll deserve it . . . but we're not going to lose," she added.

Want To Win

On the other side of the gymnasium, Red Team captain Prudence Brown was saying almost the same thing

"I want to win so bad," she said clutching her hands. "I know we have a good team and we worked so hard."

Is the competition as stiff as when the boys play basketball? "At least," says the lively Red Team captain. "I've been cheering all year for them and I've never been more excited."

Prudence, who wants to study psychology after graduation, says she likes people. "Working for Sports Nite brings the girls together," she says, "I've made a lot of friends I didn't even know in four years here.

"In spite of all the things said, I'll be sorry to leave Trenton High in June," Prudence says, "it's still the best."


When the best team has won tonight, Prudence and Virginia will agree on at least one point, as Virginia had put it, "Trenton High is great."


Trenton High Girls Honored By DAR

There were tears, naturally.


The girls on the Red Team were all choked up from the emotions of victory.

The other tears were stirred by something more provocative, defeat.


But it was all for fun and the greater glory of Trenton High School - with all of the green going into the coffers of the school's physical education fund.
