TRENTON — Next spring, Trenton Central High School will step back 22 years to revive its popular Sports Night.

The event, which is more of a pep rally than a sports competition, was originally created to fill the void left by the absence of varsity sports for female students. But since its finale in 1971, the event was thought to be forgotten.

According to Physical Education Teacher Lois Enorato, however, there is a strong desire in the community for Sports Night to be reinstated.

"Sports night was never forgotten." said Enorato, a teacher with the district since 1971. "When the superintendent asked parents what kind of activities they wanted to see, this was one of the things they mentioned."

Enorato said the event, tentatively scheduled for March 18-19, will include both male and female students from the junior and senior classes. Students will be divided into red and black squads and compete in

dancing, relay races, karate, cheer-leading and other activities.

The event is part of the students curriculum, but Enorato thinks it also will be successful in building school spirit.

"The students have heard about Sports Night but have never experienced it," she said. "Now they have a chance to make their own memories and compare them with those of their parents."

The Sports Night Committee is seeking captains of past squads and previous participants to volunteer for the upcoming event. Sponsors also are needed to help with expenses, and support from local businesses is welcome. Those interested should call Lisa Brady at 989-9256.

TRENTON — Ask any Trenton High School alumna what she remembers about her student days, and Sports Nite most likely will be high on the list of happy memories.

Sports Nite was an annual event presented by the girls of Trenton High School and the girls' athletic teams. Sports Nite competition between the black and red teams began in 1935 because of the absence of athletic teams for girls.

During the first few years of its existence, Sports Nite was held only one night. The girls who appeared in the extravaganza wore gym suits and paper costumes.

Over time, Sports Nite evolved into a five-night affair and the preparation and enthusiasm that accompanied it lasted throughout the school year.

In 1970, Sports Nite was discontinued. Today, 22 years later, it has been reinstated. Sports Nite '93, now a coed event, will be held March 18-

Sports Nite is not only a spectacular show, but also an educational experience. It is designed to bring the school community together through the use of cooperation and friendly competition. The program goes beyond mere competition. It develops social carry-over skills such as teamwork, pride, and the satisfaction of personal achievements.

Competition and general support will be held in the following areas: dance; jazz, video/character and modern marching; relay races — four different types as well as obstacle course; cheerleading; band; art/decorations; stage crew/props; ushers/runners; karate forms; acrobatics tumbling; and costumes/sewing.
