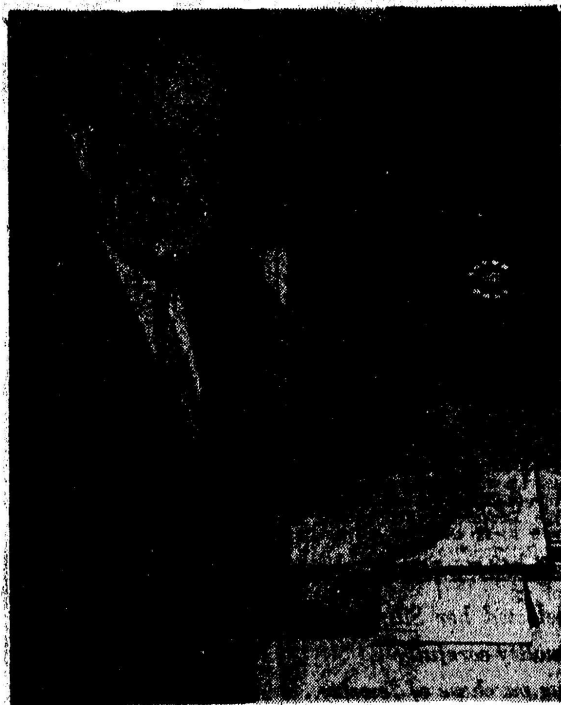

Mack Will Retire In June After 43 Years of Teaching



Francis E. Mack At His School Desk Today

Head of Woodworking Shop At Central High School Came to Trenton Immediately After Getting Diploma

Retiring next June after 43 years of service in the Trenton public schools is Francis E. Mack, of Stuyvesant Avenue, teacher of woodworking.

Mack, who came to Trenton immediately after graduation from the Oswego Normal School, is also a graduate of Rutgers University. He taught for 10 years in the elementary schools, seven more at Junior One, and seven more at Junior Three. For the last 10 years he has been in charge of the woodworking shop at Trenton High School.

Every day 150 boys work on woodworking projects in Mack's classes. Three of these are made

up of sophomores, one of juniors, and one of seniors. In the sophomore year the students get a review of the fundamental processes in woodworking, such as passing safety tests and qualifying as machine tool operators.

During the year Mack chooses the outstanding 20 percent of the sophomores who will form his junior class the following year. These boys are trained to work on school projects that require cabinet-making, woodworking or carpentering. These same fellows automatically become the senior class of the following year, when they constitute the Activities Club, which includes the 30 best woodworkers in the school. They do all of the construction for the operetta, Sports Nite and the Senior Play.

Over the years, many of them who were graduated continued with this work as a livelihood. A few of those who got their start in Trenton High and now work in this field are Charles Frankenhof, now a foreman in the pattern shop of the Thropp Corporation; Robert McClellan, who is a pattern maker at the DeLaval Steam Turbine Company; John Hartman, who is in business as a furniture repairman; and Albert Chmiele, a building contractor. This year two of the senior boys will be placed in pattern shops in the city.

The outstanding students in the present senior woodworking classes were listed as Arthur Beers, Eugene Bickel, Anthony Darniano, Harold Huizdock, Anthony Leone, John Mayer, Benjamin Updike, William Watkins, Edward Kolpack, Stanley Grygon, Frederick Piotrowski and Richard Ettinger.

Trenton High's Sport Nite Plans Five Performances

Annual Affair Set For March 20, 21, 22, 23
And 24 - Every Girl In School Will
Take Part - Boys Also Help

The sixteenth consecutive annual performance of Sport Nite will take place in the Trenton High School gymnasium from March 20 to 24, with about 1,500 girl pupils participating. Although the program is designed primarily to exhibit the work of the girls' classes in physical education, the show could not go on without the assistance of many of the boys in the bands, scene-shifting crews, and the like.

Divided into two teams, the Red and the Black, for five evenings the girls compete for points in a gay extravaganza with modern lighting effects, lavish costumes, and intricate dancing. "Sports Nite," which made its debut in 1935 as a device to stimulate the interest of the girls in physical education, was at that time but a simple one-night performance. That year points were awarded for originality and execution in only five events—dancing, cheering, racing, tumbling, and entrance—while the team performed to the music of a piano and had only gymnasium suits for costumes.

During the next few years many changes took place. Costumes were made for each number, two bands were formed, and new events were introduced. At present the program includes: prelude formalities; a preview of the entire show, ballet dancing, roller skating, marching, obstacle and skooter races, songs, cheers, tap dancing, rhythmic and modern exercises. Every girl in the school participates in at least one of the last four numbers and may take part in a few of the others as well. The principal numbers include two parts, a presentation by the group at large and a special

composed of a select number of particularly talented girls.

Student leaders are elected to guide each of the varied activities.

The leader for developing the loyalty and enthusiasm of each team is its captain, who must possess the all-important qualities which will inspire the hundreds of girls who select her to lead them. Other important roles include: Mistress of ceremonies, Miss America, bearer of the American flag, and Miss Trenton High.

Although the girls do their own research to authenticate details for the decorations supporting their theme, they must submit their ideas to the teachers of the physical education department for approval. Rarely in the limelight, the faculty members, especially those of this department, act as guiding spirits behind the whole project. But it is first, last, and always a student activity. Seniors become expert in all requirements after enacting smaller roles during their two previous years of apprenticeship.

The boys lend assistance in a few matters which require a masculine touch. Installation and maintenance of the loud-speaking equipment is done by a picked squad from the electric shop. A stagecraft crew supplies sparkle and glamour with colored lights, floodlights, and spots, while carpenters from the wood shop, also divided into Red and Black Teams, construct the props requested by the committees of the girls in charge. Each group strives for superiority in craftsmanship. Their work is evaluated, and points are awarded for the final score. The music is also supplied entirely by masculine music-makers.

Before the production is ready, weeks are spent in planning, rehearsing, and decorating.

Sports Nite has become so popular that it is now necessary to stage the contest for five consecutive nights. The first night is called preview, next comes sophomore night, then junior, then senior, then the finale, which consists of the best numbers chosen from previous nights.

The theme for Sports Nite this year is "Flight Sixteen," depicting an airplane trip around the world with each number portraying a different country.

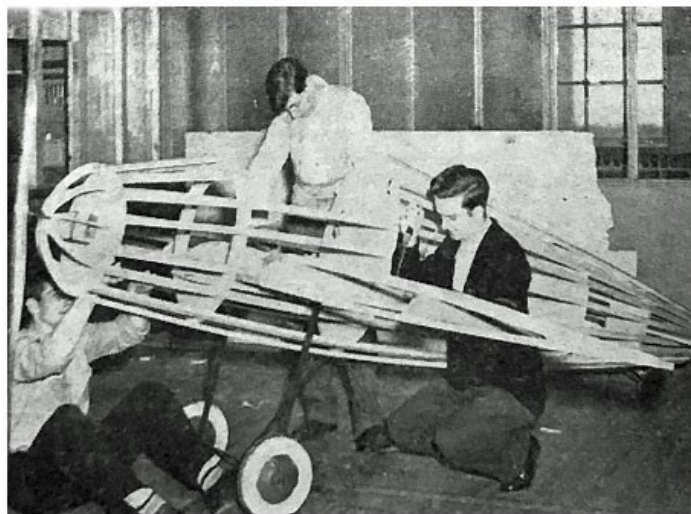

Girls Depict World Tour

Flight 16' Will Climax Intense Work of Teams; Show Opens March 20

Sports Nite will reign over Trenton High once again during the week of March 20-24, when the girls of the Red and Black Teams, led by Captains Jane Poinsett and Sally Yaeger, will match their skill and effort in a fight for victory.

After long hours of rehearsal during noon periods, study days and after school, each number and specialty is fully prepared to exhibit the grace and precision that will win the judges' vote.

Prelude Features Airport

In keeping with the theme for the show, "Flight Sixteen," the prelude headed by Margaret Marini, will feature an airport with many passengers boarding planes for a trip around the world. The marching teams of the Blacks and Reds, headed by Nancy Ide and Pat Fuccello respectively, will then make their entrance as airplane hostesses and Uncle Sams.

Black Tap, under the chairmanship of Ella Seeds, will take the audience along the Mississippi to visit the southern belles, while Red Tap will visit Santa Claus at Indiana. Iceland will be the setting for the Black Team Rhythmic number, while Paris will lead some artistic ability to the Reds. Dolores Dinzo and Dorothy Hartonczyk are chairman of these numbers respectively.

Teams Visit China, Scotland

For the Character Dance, Black Team will cross the Pacific for a visit to China with Nancy Murphy leading the way, The Reds will fly to Scotland under the supervision of Margaret Nagy. Black Modern Exercises will borrow some luck from the Irish for their number and Red Team girls will supplement the harems of Arabian rajahs. Jean Brook and Lorraine Mauer are chairmen of these numbers. The novelty and obstacle races, always the high point for suspense in the show, are headed by Hannah Lowery on the Black and Beatrice Taylor on the Red.

Ballet Depicts Love Story

The Ballet this year, under the direction of Grace Cavalieri, will tell the romantic story of Pierrot and Pierrette who fight the evils of Satan and finally find happiness together. To add a musical touch to Sports Nite, Don Rekowski and the Black Band will present "Solitude" as their theme song while Vince Iorio will lead the Red Band to their version of "Back to Sorrento."

Aside from the many dancing groups who play an active part in Sports Nite are the girls whose job is to provide an atmosphere or setting for the show. The large pictures that cover the windows of the gymnasium are painted by the girls on the Decoration Committee. These girls also decorate the "gym" galleries, and the scoreboard. Gwendolyn Sampson and Antoinette DiFilippo are chairmen of these Black and Red Committees. Properties that are used for the main and specialty numbers are designed and painted by committees headed by Lorraine Mraw and Rita Di Matteo.

Handling of music for the various dances is under the supervision of Barbara Friedman for the Black Team and Joyce Iaquinto for the Red. The costumes used in the main number are provided by committees headed by Joan Donehower and Dorothy Evans who co-operate with the sewing classes of Trenton High.

Janet Hines of the Red Team and Eileen Cella were responsible for producing a theme song for their respective teams. Publicity for the show was handled by Lorraine Margitan and Alice Graser. Large main hall posters and smaller signs were placed throughout the school many weeks before Sports Nite to raise the morale of girls on both teams. A point for the winning cover design is awarded on the first night of the show.

Shop Boys Give Finishing Touches To Gala Sports Nite Production

Although Sports Nite has always been recognized as a show presented by the girls of Trenton High, a glance behind the scenes will reveal that many boys also take a hand in making it the extravaganza it is known to be.

Much of this work takes place long before Sports Nite week arrives. The construction of properties that glamorize the various dances in the show are handled by the Activities Club under the direction of Francis E. Mack. These props must be completed with allowance of time for painting by the team property committees. The building of the airplanes to be used in the Red and Black Novelty Race illustrates the time and efforts involved. Joseph Damiano, Karl Kolpack, and Ben Updike were the appointed three who constructed the planes. The actual process took about 100 hours of work, of which 25 hours were free time given by the boys.

Many of the metal fixtures that are essential for properties are supplied by the boys in William Doolan's machine shop. Remo Funari, Massino Chiavoni, George Biferi, and John Phillips saw that running gears were placed on the airplanes. Lighting, too, is an important element in the composition of Sports Nite. This department is under the supervision of Reynold Strunk and his stage crafters group with Jules Stockman, Wesley Marple, and Peter Warter acting as co-chairs.

The boys in Willard Vroom's print shop are helping to make Sports Nite a more festive occasion by printing the Red and Black programs, motto cards and posters. To print in two colors takes a great deal more work than usual. The programs must first be printed in one color and then left to dry. Later the other color is added. Although this is double work, the boys try to include two colors in almost all of their work. A few of Mr. Vroom's helpers are John Lekka, Theordore Sherman, John McKeever, Joseph Nickles, William Swan, Emory Tilghman, William Gulli, Thoman Parker, Pat Deworocki, Anthony Bencivenzo, Mike DiBello, Wayne Moore, Ed Roberts, John Ott, and James Jobst.

Sports Nite, however, illustrates more than just the work and effort of students throughout the school. The spirit that is invoked in the crowds will glow during each night of the show when the entire school body turns out to witness a Red or Black Team victory.

The school is divided into two teams – Red and Black. Next week the rivalry will be keen. One team will probably come out on top, and the losing team will display its sportsmanship by cheering the deserving victors. This sportsmanship is a fine way to end a fine show.

The series standing shows each team with seven victories while the 1944 program ended in a tie. The Red team has won for the past three years.

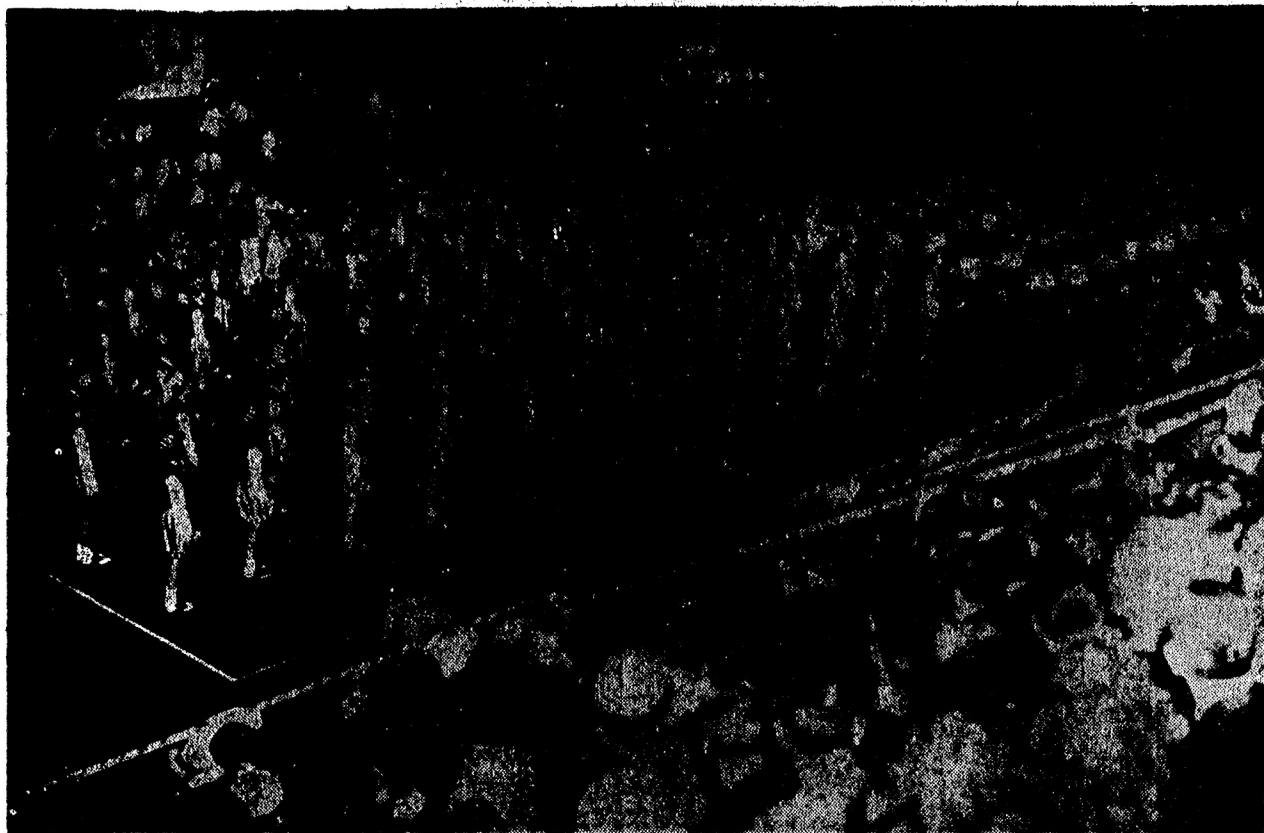

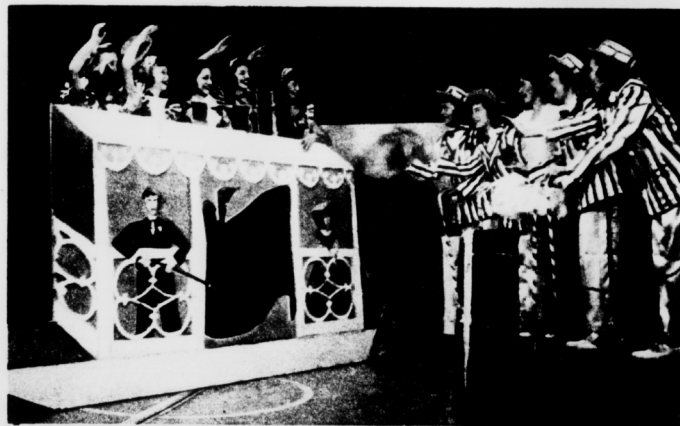

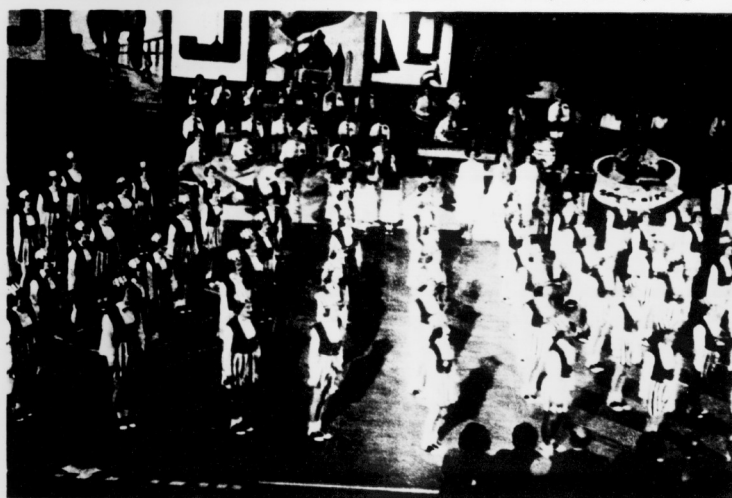
