

Show Uses New Fabrics

Snowmen, girls from Mars, sandmen, teddy bears, and spiders are just a few of the many Sport Nite features for which this year's costumes must be made. Miss Viola H. Moss, home economics teacher, is the adviser to this project.

Materials from all over the country come pouring in for the gala event. T.H.S. especially caters to such wholesale houses as Dazian's in New York and Baum's, in Philadelphia, for unusual fabrics, since these two companies furnish Broadway plays and college shows with costumes. All clothes for competitive numbers are usually of cotton or chintz. Non-competitive numbers such as ballet use sheers; this year 100 yards of satin have been ordered for such a purpose.

Often a fabric wholesale company will ask for ideas which are planned for Sport Nite costumes, and then design them and send a set.

All costumes are made here in the sewing classes except those for the specialty numbers.

Annual Sports Night Program Opens At High School Mar. 12

The 17th consecutive annual performances of Sports Nite will take place in the Trenton High School gymnasium from March 12 to 16, inclusive, with about 1,500 girls participating. Although the program is designed primarily to exhibit the work of the girls' classes in physical education, the show could not go on without the assistance of many of the boys in the bands, light crew, and scenery shifting crew.

Divided into two teams, the Red and Black, for five nights the girls compete for points in a gay extravaganza with modern lighting effects, lavish costumes and intricate dancing. Sports Night, which made its debut in 1935 as a device to stimulate the interest of the girls in physical education, was at that time a one-night performance. That year points were awarded for originality and execution in only five events: dancing, cheering, racing, tumbling, and entrance. The team performed to the music of a piano, and used gym suits for costumes.

During the next few years many changes took place. Costumes were made for each number, two bands were formed, and new events were introduced. At the present time the program includes: prelude formalities, a preview for the entire show, ballet dancing, roller skating, marching, obstacle and scooter races, songs and cheers, tap dancing, rhythmic modern exercise, and character dance. The girls participate in at least one of the last five numbers and may take part in a few of the others as well. The principal numbers include two parts, a presentation by the group at large and a specialty composed of a select number of particularly talented girls. Student leaders are elected by the girls to guide each of the activities.

The leader for developing the loyalty and enthusiasm of each team must possess the qualities which will inspire the hundreds of girls who select her to lead them. Other important roles include: a mistress of ceremonies, a Miss America, and a Miss Trenton High School.

Although the girls do their own research for the decorations supporting their theme, they must submit their ideas to the teachers of the physical education department for approval. Rarely in the limelight, the faculty members, especially those of the physical education department act as guides behind the whole project.

The boys lend assistance in a few matters which require a masculine touch. Installation and maintenance of the loudspeaking equipment is done by a picked squad from the electric shop. A stagecraft crew supplies sparkle and glamour with colored lights, floodlights, and spots, while carpenters from the wood shop, also divided into the two teams, construct the props requested by the committees of the girls in charge. Each group strives for superiority in craftsmanship. Their work is evaluated, and points are awarded for the final score. The music is also supplied by the boys who are divided into Red and Black Teams. Each band has a leader selected by the captain of the team.

17th Annual Trenton High Sports Nite Opens Monday

The 17th annual exhibition of Sports Nite at Central High School will be held this year during the week of March 12. Since 1935, when the series was originated, the Red Team has won show, many departments of the eight times, and the Black Team school make contributions. The seven. One year saw a tie. "Imagine That!" is the theme of this year's show. Preparations are now in full swing at the school.

When a girl enters Central High School as a sophomore, she makes a choice of whichever team she wishes to join and she remains a member of that team throughout her school career. In planning and producing this show, many departments of the school make contributions. The only boys who have an active part in the performance itself are the two bands that play all the music used in the show. However boys and girls from other departments take care of construction of the properties, making of the costumes, installation and operation of the public address system and lighting effects.

Personnel Outlined

Each team works under the leadership of a captain. A chairman is elected by each team for each of the many activities involved. The captains and the gym teachers together decide on the theme and all activities are based on this theme. A committee chosen by the two captains and assisted by the gym teachers then select the official family from among all candidates. The official family consists of the two captains, a mistress of ceremonies, A Miss America, a Miss Trenton High and their color guards.

Other committee chairmen are selected for each feature of the show. These include marching, tap-dancing, rhythmic, prelude, ballet, games, skating, character dance, songs and cheers. Committees also work on costumes, publicity, decorations, theme song and properties.

Sports Nite was started in 1935 and was at first a one night performance. Now it runs for five nights. Monday is preview night, with performers selected by the gym teachers. Sophomore girls perform on Tuesday night, juniors on Wednesday and seniors on Thursday. On the last night, Friday, the captains select what they consider the best numbers from all other nights.

Points are awarded for each of the competitive numbers. Acts which are non-competitive include skating, ballet and the prelude. Points for the competitive numbers are accumulative and the total score on the last night indicates which team is the victor. Judges are selected from all over New Jersey and surrounding States. Specialists in their field judge the art and music, while physical education and dancing teachers judge the special numbers.

Sports Nite Spectacular

Philadelphia has its Mummers Parade, New Orleans has its Mardi Gra, Pasadena has its Tournament of Roses and Trenton has its Sports Nite.

Originated in 1935 as a one-night affair to display talents of the Trenton High School girls in physical education activities, Sports Nite has mushroomed through the years into a week-long display which heightens blood pressure of many teenagers in the area and aroused more than passing interest in most other Trentonians.

Everyone in the area is either a "Black" or "Red" – team member or booster, that is. This is one occasion when the label "Red" has no odious connotation. Such a friendly rivalry might well be emulated by world governments.

This year's production was originally titled "Out Of This World" but both Cole Porter and Lowell Thomas Jr. secured prior rights – the former by a smash musical about mighty Greek gods and lowly mortals and the latter by a book about adventures in far-off Tibet. Hasty consultation changed the title to "Imagine That."

The girls of both teams used their imagination in devising production numbers. Witches, elves, devils, spiders, kittens and other creatures of the world of fantasy will prance and cavort over the spacious gymnasium floor. Colorful costumes and striking decorations will help transport the spectator to this wonderland of fancy.

To equalize the burden of a five-night affair, each night has been assigned to various groups. Monday night features a preview. Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday are taken over by sophomores, juniors and seniors, respectively. Friday night brings the grand finale, consisting of the best numbers from previous nights.

Although Sports Nite is predominantly an all-girl affair, the boys do lend valuable assistance. They build the props and decorations, handle lighting, play in the band and other details requiring a physical effort.

To Janet Brigss and Marjorie Saville have gone the highest honor that Sports Nite can bestow, as Red and Black team captains. The Sports Nite official family also consists of Janet Gebbard as Miss America, Ronata Kaufman as Miss Trenton High, and Barbara Friedman as Mistress of Ceremonies.

Augmenting and accompanying the dancing, marching, singing are the team bands: Anthony Femiano (Black) and Elliott Aldrich (Red). And above every number are careful supervision and guidance by the faculty staff headed by Edward Murphy.

Behind the scenes of the extravaganza are countless rehearsals of tireless effort. A thousand help with details in planning, reviewing, costuming, decorating, writing, and speaking are made by practically every member of the Trenton High family.

Thousands will be able to see the fruits of this tremendous effort and thousands will not be so lucky, so for the latter, both radio stations WTTM and WBUD will offer on-the-air coverage of the closing portions on Monday through Thursday and complete coverage on Friday evening for the finals.

Only one team can win and the other face defeat, however both teams share in the greater satisfaction of a job very well done.



Once again, the Red and Black teams will vie for victory in the 17th annual Sport Nite which will begin on Monday, March 12 and run through Friday, March 16. After long and intensive lunchtime, after school, study day and Saturday practices and meetings, directed by Red Team Captain Janet Briggs, and Black Team Captain, Marjorie Saville, nearly every girl in Trenton High is ready to do her part in the production.

A great deal is done to make Sport Nite possible by girls working "behind the scenes." Red and Black Property Committees, under Marcia Spitz and Loretta Ewaskiewicz, have made all the props used in the competitive numbers. Decoration committees, headed by Janice Balint and Gail Brian, are preparing extensive decorations for the gymnasium.

Committees Work Hard

The costume committees are finishing up the great amount of costumes which they made, helped by various sewing classes. Virginia De Feo and Katherine McConnell are responsible for this job. Music committees, under Rosalyn Marcus and Lynne Hartman, aided in choosing music and playing at practice while the Publicity Committees, under Nancy Ribsam and Robin Holman, have encouraged enthusiasm with many posters set up around T.H.S. and a main hall poster.

The actual numbers will follow this year's theme of "Imagine That." Marchers have been drilled to near perfection by Catherine Deodata and Sally McCarthy. The Red Marchers as "Kilowatt Kids" and Black Marchers as snowmen, will sing their respective theme songs which were written by Mary Ann Revolinski and Janet Ford.

Red and Black cheerleaders, led by Lydia Santin and Peggy Sams, will enter as "Girls From Mars" and "Black Magic." Red, Black Bands To Play

Red Band, under the direction of Elliott Aldrich, will play "Night and Day," while the Black Band, under Tony Femiano, will play "Blue Room." Red and Black Novelty and Obstacle Races will be run with Barbara Springer and Hannah Lowry at their head.

Three non-competitive numbers will be presented. Prelude, under Jean Feeder, will be titled "Celestial Fantasy," and ballet, under Gloria Bely, will be a dance of "Heavenly Bodies." 

Sports Nite At High School Will Be Launched Tomorrow

The Black team will attempt to even the series score this week in the 17th annual exhibition of Sports Nite which will get under way tomorrow at Central High School.

Since the opening of the series in 1933, the Red team has won eight times and the Black team seven. The teams tied one year. A victory this year for the Black team would therefore leave the series standings exactly even.

Preparations have been in the making for several weeks at the school. The theme of this year's show is "Imagine That!"

When a girl enters Central High School as a sophomore, she

makes a choice of whichever team she wishes to join and she remains a member of that team throughout her school career. In planning and producing this show, many departments of the school make contributions. The only boys who have an active part in the performance itself are the two bands that play all the music used in the show. However boys and girls from other departments take care of construction of the properties, making of the costumes, installation and operation of the public address system and lighting effects.

Each team works under the leadership of a captain. A chairman is elected by each team for each of the many activities involved. The captains and the gym teachers together decide on the theme and all activities are based on this theme. A committee chosen by the two captains and assisted by the gym teachers then select the official family from among all candidates. The official family consists of the two captains, a mistress of ceremonies, A Miss America, a Miss Trenton High and their color guards.

Other committee chairmen are selected for each feature of the show. These include marching, tap-dancing, rhythmnics, prelude, ballet, games, skating, character dance, songs and cheers. Committees also work on costumes, publicity, decorations, theme song and properties.

Sports Nite was started in 1935 and was at first a one night performance. Now it runs for five nights. Monday is preview night, with performers selected by the gym teachers. Sophomore girls perform on Tuesday night, juniors on Wednesday and seniors on Thursday. On the last night, Friday, the captains select what they consider the best numbers from all other nights.

Points are awarded for each of the competitive numbers. Acts which are non-competitive include skating, ballet and the prelude. Points for the competitive numbers are accumulative and the total score on the last night indicates which team is the victor. Judges are selected from all over New Jersey and surrounding States. Specialists in their field judge the art and music, while physical education and dancing teachers judge the special numbers.




